Broadmead

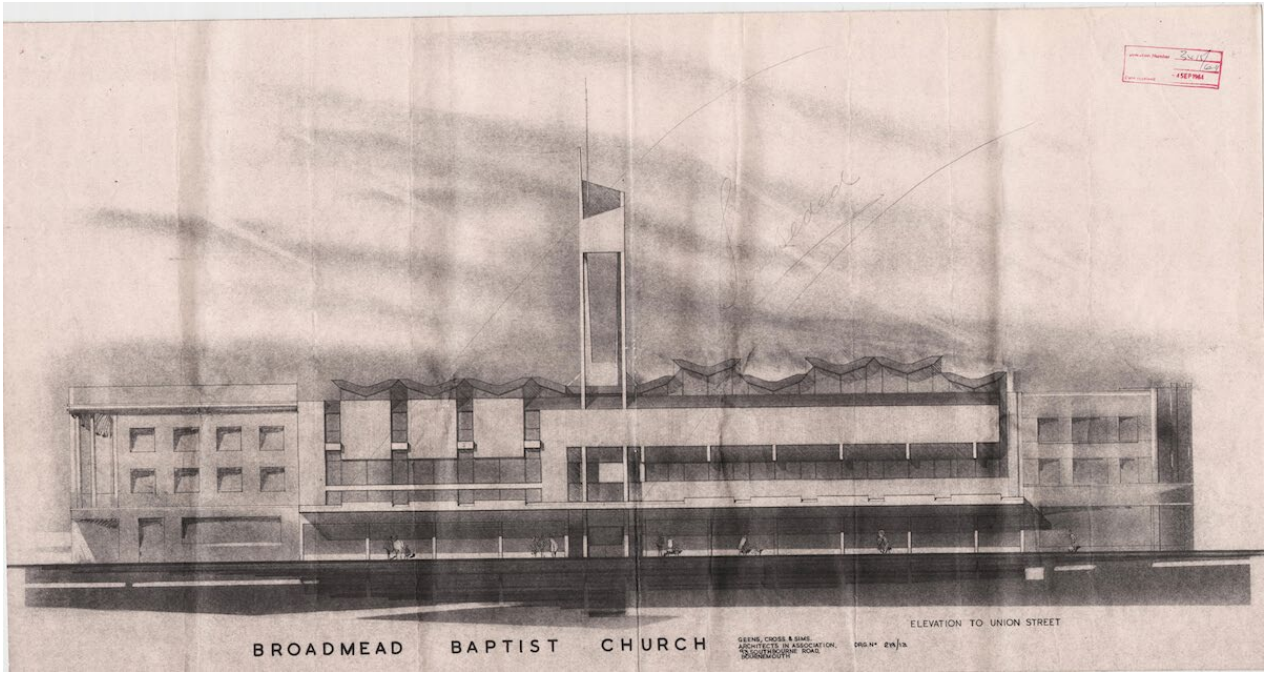

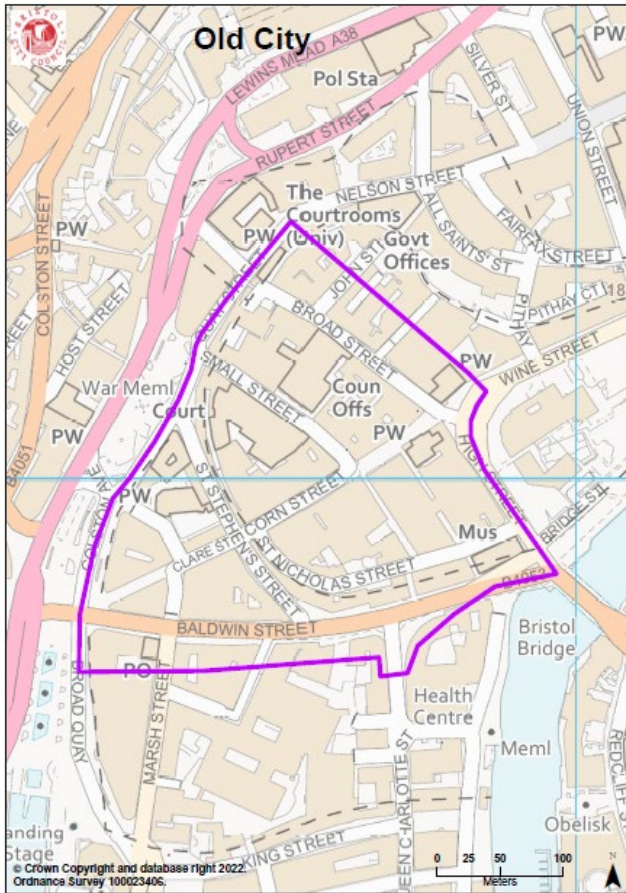

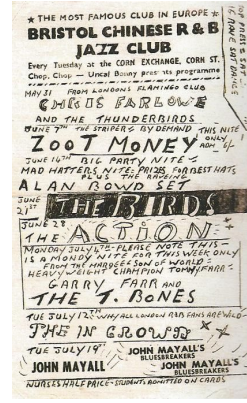

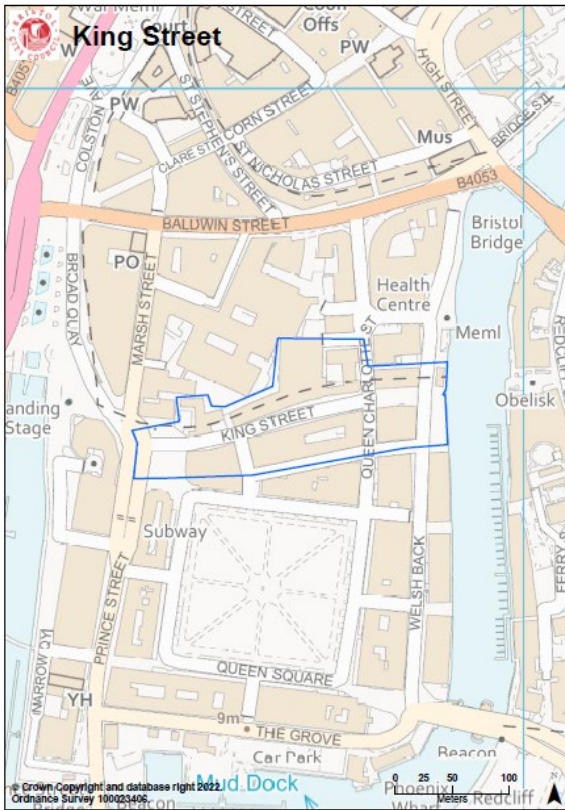

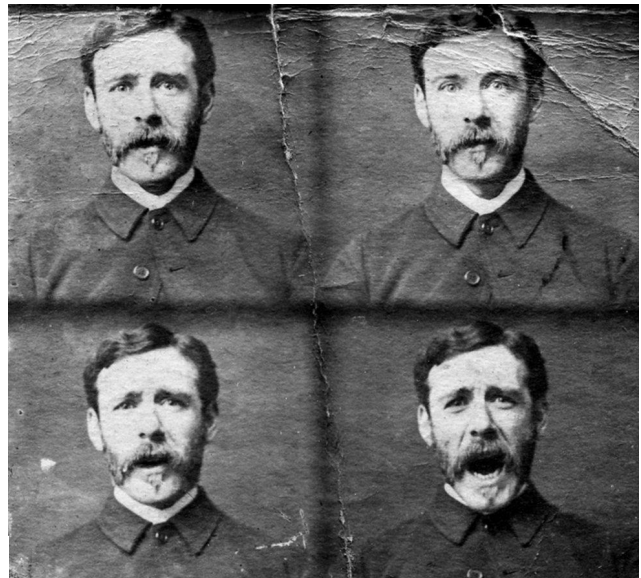
