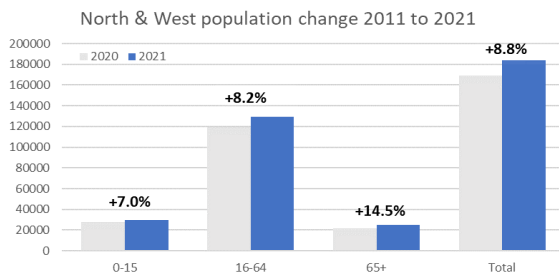

POPULATION



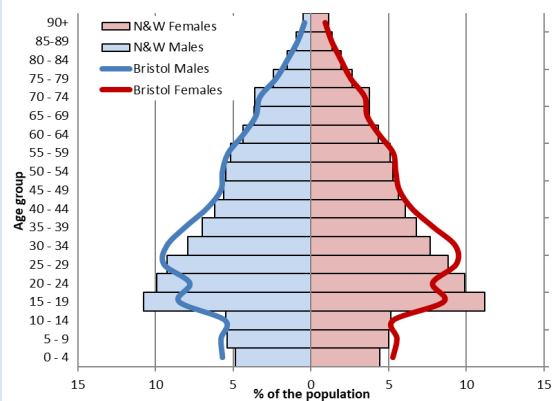

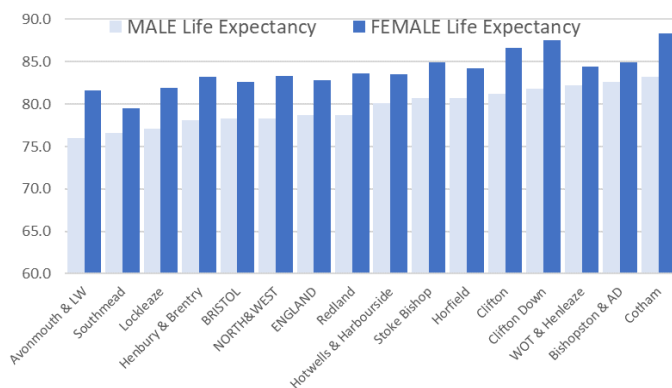

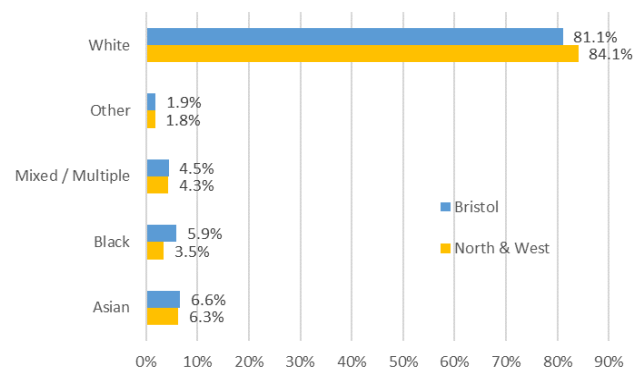

LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH (2019-21)¹

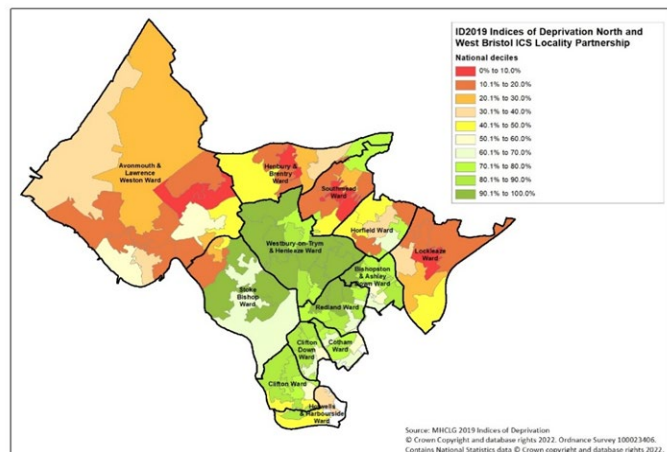

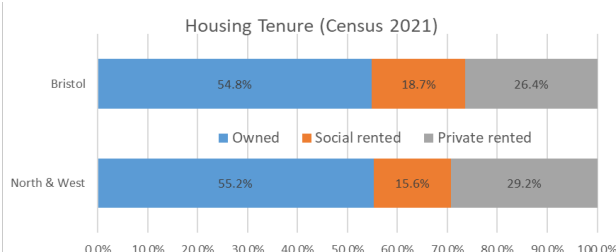


DEPRIVATION

- North and West Bristol has a significantly lower proportion of residents living in the most deprived areas of Bristol than the Bristol average (8.6% v 19.9%)
- Southmead ward is the fourth most deprived ward in the city, Avonmouth & Lawrence Weston is the 5th most deprived, Lockleaze is the 6th most deprived and Henbury & Brentry is the 7th most deprived ward in the city
- Southmead Central is the most deprived LSOA in N&W, and is ranked the 11th most deprived in all of Bristol and the 613th most deprived in England (out of 32,844 LSOA's)
- 15.1% of children under 16 in North and West Bristol live in low income families, significantly lower than both the Bristol average of 21.7% and the England average of 19.9% (2021/22).



HOUSING



- 131 households are living in temporary accommodation in North and West Bristol, which equates to 10.5% of all households housed in temporary accommodation by Bristol City Council (31st May 23)

ADULT SOCIAL CARE

At a snapshot taken on 31st March 2023, there were:

- 1,556 service users, 676 (43%) were male and 880 (57%) were female
- The primary support reason was Physical (52%), followed by Learning Disability Support (18%), Mental Health Support (15%), Support with Memory and Cognition (8%) and other (7%)
- The main care types required by service users include Homecare (28%), Direct payments (15%), Nursing (14%), Supported Living (11%), Supported accommodation (10.5%) and Residential (10%).

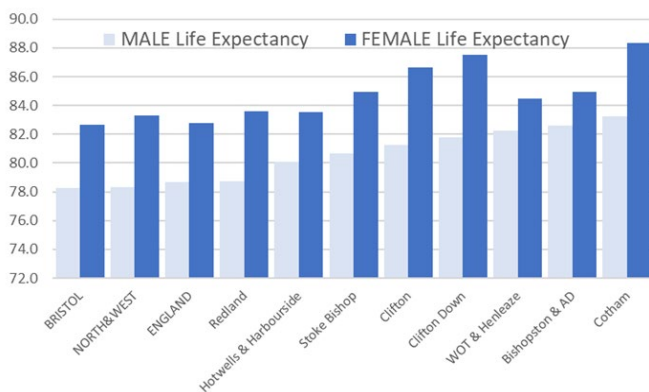

LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH (2019-21)¹

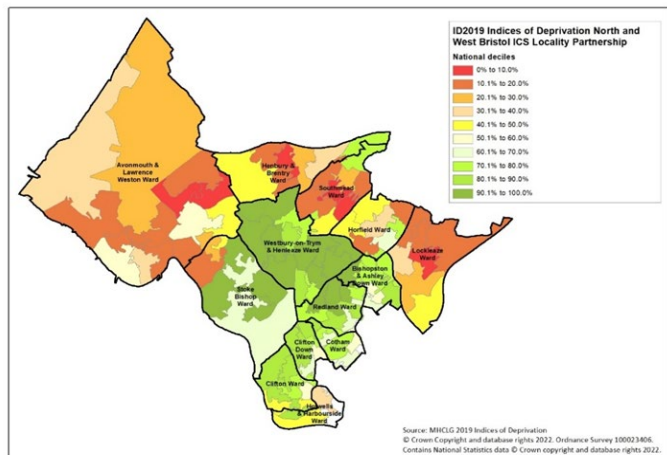

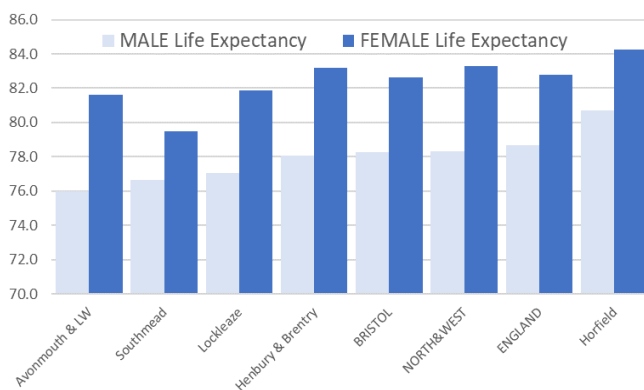

LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH (2019-21)¹

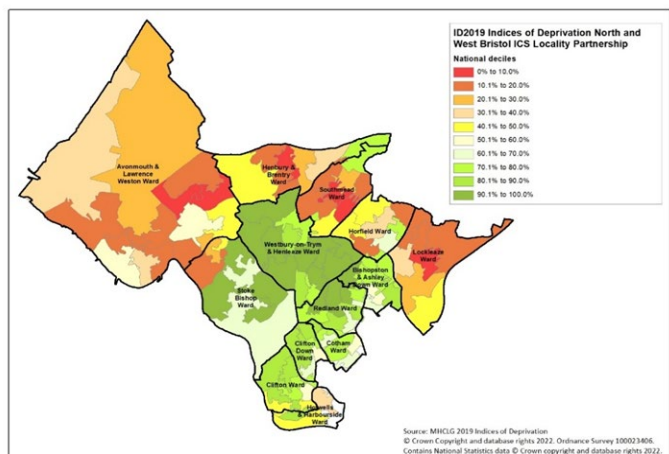

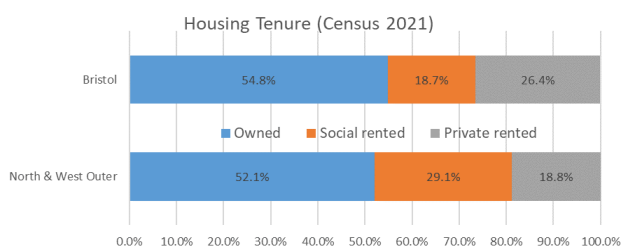
